Lecture Tests

- Four non-cumulative lecture tests (multiple choice questions) will be given during the semester.
- Tests will consist of 75 multiple choice questions or matching; and each test will account for 20% of the course grade.
- For all tests, you will be required to present your current MSU student ID (for grading purposes and student verification) when you turn in your scantron sheet.
- If you leave the classroom before completing a test, you will not be allowed to reenter.
- Test scores will not be curved.
- Test questions will be taken from your notes, homework assignments, and special reading assignments
- You will not be allowed to take a test if you are more than 15 minutes late, or if another student has already turned in a test (whichever comes first).
- Failure to comply with any of the following rules will be regarded as cheating when tests/pop quizzes are given:

Textbooks, notebooks, etc., must be closed and placed under your seat.

Phones/pagers/all other electronic devices must be turned off and out of sight. If a phone or any other electronic device is visible after I remind you to turn phones off and put them and other electronic devices away, your test score will be voided. This policy applies while you are taking a test, standing in line to turn in a test, and leaving the room. In other words, phones or any other electronic devices should not be in use or visible in the room at any time after I instruct the class to turn them off and put them away.

Caps, hoodies, watches, and earphones/ear buds/etc. may not be worn during tests.

Do not talk to another student or look at another student's test answers.

Penalty for cheating:

You will be referred to the University Academic Honesty Committee and you will be issued an "**xF**" for the course grade.

The "x" before the "F" on your academic transcript indicates that you were cheating in the course.

- Completed tests and scantrons will not be returned to you, but may be reviewed during instructor's scheduled office hours up to one week following each test.
- You will have two weeks following each test date to schedule a test review.
- Your score becomes permanent and no changes will be made after the two week period has passed.
- Test scores may be viewed by selecting "MyGrades" on the BIO 1144 MyCourses Home Page.

<u>POLICY/PROCEDURE:</u> Upon registration, the student accepts the responsibility of attending all classes and doing any work the instructor may prescribe. Tips for Mastering Course Content

Don't skip class!

Do you really want to rely on someone else's notes? Could cost you points on the tests.

Miss examples/explanations not recorded in the notes.

Stay current!

You should know the material covered each week well enough to be tested on it the following week.

Don't just memorize the lecture material!

You will be asked to apply the material to novel situations on the tests.

Block notes into small sections!

Small is the key word. No more info than would fit on one side of a 3x5 index card.

Learn the material in the first block before moving on to the next.

This method will help you to remember more details.

Prepare Flash Cards

A number of apps are available for generating virtual flash cards such as StudyBlue and Quizlet. You might prefer to make your own flash cards using index cards.

On one side of card include a term/concept/etc. and on the flip side include the definition/description/etc.
